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Awards and bursaries scheme open for applications

We are delighted to announce that our Awards and Bursaries scheme for 2017 is now open for applications. The deadline to apply for an award is the 3rd May and applications can be made to three separate funds – Research Training Bursaries, Personal Research Awards and the BOPA-PRUK Research Award. These schemes are designed to equip pharmacy professionals with the skills needed to contribute to and progress research in the sector. A summary of each scheme has been included below, or

[Personal Research Awards](#): These are available to registered pharmacists and this unique funding is to enable pharmacists to develop the research skills required to advance their research career. Proposals from a wide variety of pharmacy topics will be considered as the purpose of the scheme is to build research capacity within pharmacy practice.

[Research Training Bursaries](#): Research training bursaries provide funding for community and primary care pharmacists who have an interest in developing their skills in conducting research relating to every day practice. There are three levels of funding, depending on the qualifications that are being worked towards.

[BOPA-PRUK Research Award](#): The BOPA-PRUK Research Award is designed for pharmacy professionals in oncology and haematology to undertake research projects in translational and health service related to oncology and haematology pharmacy, with a focus on patient benefit.

Key note speakers

Professor Sue Ziebland: Professor of Medical Sociology, University of Oxford - Sue's background is in medical sociology, with increasing focus on qualitative research

approaches. Sue has worked as a researcher in the academic, NHS and voluntary sectors and has published over 150 papers and chapters in social science and health publications.

Professor Justin Waring: Professor of Organisational Sociology, University of Nottingham - Justin's research background and teaching deals with the reconfiguration and governance of public services, with a particular focus on the changing organisation and management of healthcare services. His primary interest is to understand how new organisational forms and processes interact with institutionalised professional practices, cultures and identities; and how such institutional influences can both stimulate or stymie reform.

Professor Fiona Patterson: Founding Director of the Work Psychology Group and Researcher, University of Cambridge - Fiona was Head of Organisational Psychology at The Boots Corporation Plc and an internal consultant psychologist at Ford Motor Company Limited (Global) in the corporate sector. Fiona publishes regularly in the highest-ranking journals in Psychology (e.g. Journal of Applied Psychology) and in Medicine (e.g. British Medical Journal, Medical Education). She is co-author of the leading international textbook Work Psychology and has published over 80 peer reviewed journal articles. She has recently launched a new international research network for selection and assessment for the healthcare professions with contributors from around the globe.

Pharmacist ‘intelligent’ referrals to a Psychiatric Liaison Team

In December we were pleased to announce the publication of research funded by the charity which explored the role that pharmacists could play in enhancing mental health patients’ access to a psychiatric liaison team. The study also aimed to establish whether a new pharmacy referral system could facilitate a reduction in the time from admission to referral to the psychiatric liaison team, in addition to increasing the number of patients accessing the service; and to explore the process of referrals to a psychiatric liaison team in an acute NHS Hospital Trust. Research advice surgeries


